### Deaf Ministry Beginning!

Beginning October 14 in the late service, our Deaf Ministry Team will be interpreting the worship service. We will be having some folks who will be joining us for worship that are deaf. To introduce ourselves to this new ministry, I would like to quote a couple of things from an LCMS webpage for Hearing Congregations.

#### Jargon

##### "Deaf" vs "deaf"

Deaf people who use American Sign Language do not identify themselves as individuals with a pathology of hearing loss. Rather, they see themselves as people with a unique language and cultural experience. Hence, we capitalize the word "Deaf" when describing members of this community. Deaf ministry may properly be viewed as an ethnic ministry.

##### "Deaf" vs "Hearing Impaired"

The term "hearing impaired" was created by hearing people as a euphemistic alternative to "deaf" and "hard of hearing." However, members of the Deaf community proudly identify themselves as "Deaf" and prefer this label.

##### "Hard of Hearing"

People who are clinically described as having a moderate to severe hearing loss may, with the marginal help of hearing aids and a facility for lip-

reading, successfully communicate orally in hearing society. None the less, because many hard of hearing individuals share a common cultural experience with those who have a profound hearing loss, including fluency in American Sign Language, they find their identity in the Deaf community.

"Patience:" As we begin this new ministry, keep in mind the following about having patience. Many religious groups have attempted to minister to Deaf people. Some have often emphasized the fellowship and social ministry aspects of ministry. Others simply schedule an interpreter for Sunday worship before they have invested in outreach into the Deaf community. They have also tended to work for a period to time and then give up.

Many Deaf people feel that hearing Christians merely seek to target them for conversion without making the long term commitment to understand their culture and become their friends. If you want to begin a mission with Deaf people, commit yourself to a long process which will have slow growth.

Fruitful Deaf ministry defies the popular business model which seeks to channel resources where "we want to get the biggest bang for the buck." We want to keep in mind the parables of the lost sheep and the lost coin, as we ask ourselves, "If we don't tell Deaf people about Jesus, who will?"

That is why we are beginning.

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Here is how you can help make this ministry be successful:

1. Pray that the Lord will bless this ministry. Specifically pray that the advertising and word of this service gets to the people who need it.
2. That those who see the advertising are motivated to come and worship at Trinity.
3. Be prepared to help out those who visit us. Show that you are happy that they are coming. That means have a smile on your face (a nice non-verbal clue to anyone). Be willing to help them around... like where bathrooms are etc. That may mean walking with them to show them.
4. Let your friends, neighbors and family know we are beginning this ministry. You may know a friend who perhaps has a deaf child or deaf spouse. Let them know.
5. Pray that they join our family here at Trinity.
6. Funds to begin this ministry are coming from a grant that Trinity has received from LuHi. If you would like to financially contribute to this, the cost of an interpreter is \$100 per service. Write in the memo line, Deaf Ministry. That will get it to the right place.

Now, you may be wondering where this person will stand in the service. When looking at the altar, the interpreter will be on the left hand side of the sanctuary near the baptismal font. Standing in front of the far left section of the pews. Therefore, if someone comes in and needs to be able to see the interpreter, encourage them to sit on the left side of the church... in front of the lectern.

So on the second Sunday in October and Sundays after, when folks come in that don't look familiar to you, put a smile on your face and greet everyone you do not know that they may feel welcome and loved. (This is something we should be doing all the time!)

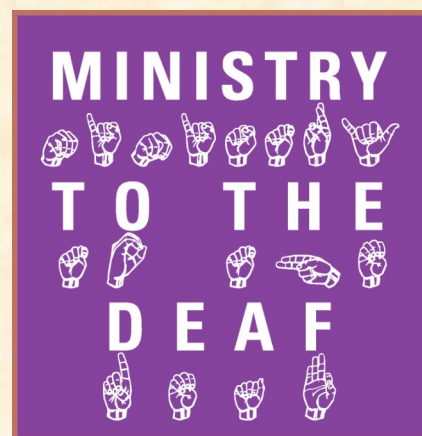
In addition to all the new beginnings, we will have a guest presentation on Sunday October 6. Pastor Dunseth, Director of Deaf Ministry for Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, will be here to speak to us regarding opportunities for Deaf Ministry on how we can be even more involved with reaching out to this community with Interpreted Services being a great start. He will speak for a few minutes after the early service and prior to the late service. I personally look forward to him speaking for he goes all over the globe to help start deaf ministry.

As I think about this ministry, and quite frankly all the ministries we have going on here at Trinity, the following verses come immediately to mind:

*"Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen." Ephesians 3:20-21*

Remember this as you pray. It serves as a great reminder for what the Lord can do!

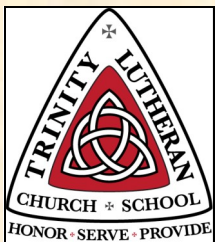
### **NEW ORGAN UPDATE – AND SO IT BEGINS!**

Starting on Monday, workmen from the Walker Organ Company in Zionsville, PA will be here to begin installation of our new organ for a week. You probably won't see too much when you come in next week, since they will be mostly running wires and preparing the church for the organ itself which will come on November 5. The workmen will be mostly running wires and setting up the new speakers for the instrument. Most of the work will be done in the balcony, but if you look close you will see some of it. During this time, our old organ will be 95% playable until the new console (the part of the organ that we normally call "the organ") arrives in November. In November they will be connecting everything and spending time on "voicing," which means adjusting the sounds on the organ to our room. We will have one weekend, November 10/11 where we will be without an organ, as the installation and voicing continues. If all goes according to plan, the new instrument will be used in worship for the first time on the weekend of November 17/18.

### **The Good News** *Honor, Serve, Provide*



The Capital Campaign Committee can report that as we turn our attention to Trinity School's 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, we now have 120 pledges of \$204,000 toward our \$210,000 three-year goal. We have received over \$130,000 from those pledges and we are happy to report from memorial gifts as well.

Individuals and groups across Trinity's family have joined with the committee in this effort. Members of the Board of Properties, who work non-stop to maintain our buildings, have overseen projects detailed below. In addition, the Boy Scouts and the ushers have contributed to and have overseen the replacement of the church parking lot lighting to high intensity energy efficient lights, improving the security of the area.

With Campaign funds the Board of Properties has already:

- overseen installation of new carpeting in the church
- repaired numerous windows in the church and school
- improved security with the addition of high intensity lighting in the Church parking lot and by adding a new intercom at the school's main entrance, and
- renovated the science classroom (to be completed by the end of October).

In addition:

- the heating system is in the process of being repaired
- supplementary counseling services have been made available to church and school families
- further financial aid and scholarships have been provided to school families.

We also plan to replace the ceiling tiles in hallways and the multipurpose room, as well as replace lighting in those ceilings with energy efficient lighting.

The progress this campaign has made is uplifting. We are looking forward to the next phase of the campaign: observance of the school's 65<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The "Back to School" Church service and barbecue were well attended and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Please watch for details of the events being planned to celebrate the school's 65<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

I bet that those of you who are willing to admit it, in the late 1950's or early 1960's were fans of Mad Magazine. Do you remember the goofy looking guy who was the face of the magazine? Alfred E. As we look at our town, as we look at Nassau County and our state and nation we have to acknowledge that they have changed significantly over the past decades. They are no longer the same places which existed when our church was growing rapidly and expanding in the latter half of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. Our mission field has changed.

In the past, most people knew about Jesus even if they did not serve Him. Outright pagans were few in number. The greatest missionary challenge that this church had to face were nominal Christians who had a religious upbringing, perhaps were baptized and confirmed, but who had turned away from God when they grew older.

In years past the nation was predominantly God-fearing, dominated by the Judeo-Christian ethic. People believed in hard work, integrity, honesty and decency. We have always had crime and criminals, but despite all their faults, most people tried to live moral lives. Those who practiced sinful lifestyles were ostracized or imprisoned. Most people knew about Jesus even if they did not serve Him. Outright pagans were few in number.

As a result of recent immigration, this has changed significantly. There are thousands of pagans and agnostics at our doorstep in Hicksville, millions in the metropolitan area. Most of these immigrants know little or nothing about Jesus Christ. In addition, due to the popularity of pluralism as well as the foreign religions imported by new immigrants, there are now scores of religions and philosophies competing for the attention of our unchurched neighbors.

In an effort to attract new people many churches have blended Christianity with paganism. Many have incorporated beliefs, ideas and practices that are foreign to the Bible. Many water down the gospel of Jesus Christ into another feel-good religion, a religion of self-fulfillment in which man is the central focus, not God. Truth is only relative.

Most of us feel woefully unprepared for this new mission field. We feel discouraged; we feel we lack the power, skill or energy to carry out that mission. We feel completely baffled by this challenge on our doorstep.

Yet God has placed us here for a reason. Like it or not, He has chosen us for this time and for His purpose. And because He has chosen us He has given us the tools we need to carry out the mission, but they are His tools not ours, not the ones we think up or that other men will tell us will work. They are the same tools Christians have been using for the last 2000 years. He has given us His Holy Spirit to guide us, to empower us to carry out that work. And He has also given us His Word of truth. Despite our faults, our church has never abandoned its concern for the primacy of God's word and the sovereignty of God's rule. We have sought to maintain the purity of God's truth. And now we find ourselves an outpost of truth smack dab in the middle of pagan territory. We no longer have to send people to foreign nations to be missionaries. The mission field is right outside our front door.

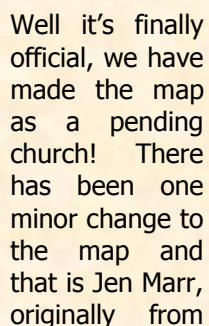
## **The Good News** *Early Childhood Center News*

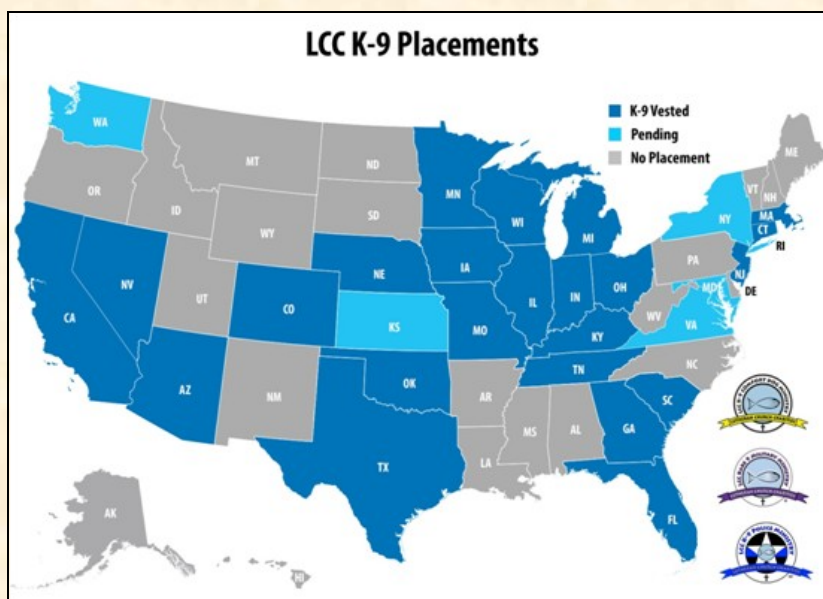

Beginning on Wednesday, October 17, Pastor Hopkins will be leading a new Bible study! We will be delving into the Gospel of Mark which "emphasizes that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. Jesus announced the Kingdom of God, healed the sick, and died as a ransom for sinners. In addition to Jesus, Mark features three main groups of people: the disciples, the crowds, and the religious leaders, none of whom understood Jesus. When the time came for Jesus to go to the cross, the religious leaders arrested him, the disciples abandoned him, and the crowds jeered him. Only when he died alone on the cross did a Roman centurion recognize that he was the Son of God. Though the book is anonymous, tradition identifies John Mark (Acts 12:12) as the author. He may have based his Gospel on Peter's preaching, writing sometime in the 50's or 60's a.d."

This Bible study will be held on Wednesdays at 7:00pm in the Youth/Senior Room and will initially run for five weeks, until we begin Advent. After the Christmas holiday, it will then pick up on Wednesday, January 2 and continue up until the Wednesday before Ash Wednesday.

**"MY SPIRIT REJOICES IN GOD MY SAVIOR"** is the title of the round stained glass panel located above the double doorway entrance of the Stammel Foyer. It was given by the Kramer family and the people of Trinity Lutheran Church in memory of the life and ministry of Stanley J. Kramer.

The large, four-foot round panel was designed by Ellen Kerwin, Art teacher at Trinity Lutheran Church and School. The design style along with the same combination of Spectrum Water, Wissmach Opalescent and German Antique Glass complement the two existent memorial windows designed by Stan Kramer. It was a great honor for Guy Somers of Somers Stained Glass, Stony Brook, NY, to be asked to craft this panel memorializing Stan. He and Stan had developed a close working relationship when they had designed and executed the four existing Kramer stained glass windows at Trinity.

The title for the stained glass panel was taken from the Magnificat, an ancient Christian hymn also known as "The Song of Mary." Mary sang these words "My soul magnifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior" in the Gospel of Luke when she expressed her joy in knowing she was carrying the Savior of the world in her womb. These words have special significance to all Christians because they teach us how to properly praise God and put the emphasis on the Lord and His gifts to us.

The triangle (which symbolizes the Trinity) serves to unify the entire panel, for it is the basis of all Christian doctrine: God, three persons in one, is the Father who created and sustains the world, Christ Jesus who provides for the forgiveness of our sins, and the Holy Spirit who guides us and sanctifies our Christian life. Three doves are featured on each side of the triangle. In scripture, the dove symbolizes the Holy Spirit. The doves serve to represent ministries of the Holy Spirit in the life of a believer.

The descending dove (left) reminds us of Jesus' baptism in Matthew 3:16b, "and behold, the heavens were opened to Him, and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming to rest on Him..." It also reminds all believers of our own baptismal day when we were adopted into the family of God. The cross adjacent to the dove symbolizes God's grace to us; the sacrifice of His only Son for our eternal salvation.

The center dove reminds all Christians that the Holy Spirit lives in each one of us. As Romans 12:6a states "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given us, let us use them..." We are encouraged to use our God-given talents to glorify Christ and He will send His Spirit to be our Teacher and Helper. By the ministry of the Holy Spirit our sins are revealed through God's law. God's Spirit will work through prayer to intercede for us. By God's promise all Christians can call upon the Holy Spirit to be our Comforter in times of need.

The ascending dove (top right) is a symbolic reminder to all believers to follow the Spirit's guidance in all our thoughts, words and actions. Galations 5:25 states, "If we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the Spirit." This dove also represents God's promise that His Spirit is with us, "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20)

The three doves are entwined in festive colored ribbons. They are joined by the fanfare of trumpets in joyous celebration announcing the glorious news of our salvation through Christ Jesus. Praises and thanksgiving are echoed from generation to generation in a continuous jubilee for all those who walk in the Spirit.
