Luke 1:30-31

Monday, December 3

"But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day. The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance." 2 Peter 3:8-9

Peter teaches that we do not look at time in the same way that God does. We are finite beings, bound by time, but God is not. As a result, our perspective is naturally short-sighted, while God keeps a long-range view beyond our ability to comprehend. Remember, these verses appear in the context of Christ's return, so what the Father and the Son consider to be a short time before the Kingdom is established can seem like an eternity to us—or as if He delays His coming.

The apostle also indicates Christ's longsuffering as a reason that the end has not yet come. In our opinion, He should have returned already and put a stop to all the world's wrongs. However, His longsuffering is not due to slowness or tardiness, as the carnally-minded think. Rather, His longsuffering is a gift to us, so that we do not have to perish in His judgment.

Our focus tends to be on how bad the world is getting, yet Peter subtly draws us back to our own spiritual condition. Jesus is longsuffering toward us so that we have ample time to repent, not in the sense of initial conversion, but to turn fully and have our hearts completely changed. In its fullest sense, repentance is not complete until we are finally in His image.

Even though we may be frustrated that we do not see more end-time prophecies coming to pass, Peter explains it as a blessing to us because it means that Christ will not wrap things up before we have had a full and complete opportunity to repent. We can be thankful for God's timetable, not because it means we have more time to flirt with this world, but because He is providing everything we need to follow our salvation to its conclusion, including the time.

Then those who feared the LORD spoke with one another. Malachi 3:16-17

Have you ever been lost? Perhaps you got separated from your parents as a kid. Or, maybe it was driving in a big city with no GPS. I remember hiking once and losing my way. Christmas Day, Tuesday, December 25

One of my family’s favorite breakfast items for Christmas morning is Monkey Bread. The recipe we like uses frozen dinner rolls. First, you put the frozen dinner rolls in a Bundt pan. Then you mix all the other ingredients together (See recipe link below). The most important thing about this recipe is that you need to prepare it the night before... typically right before you go to bed. Why? You need to allow time for the dinner rolls to thaw. Then after they have thawed, the dinner rolls will rise on their own. So then you put the pan in a pre-heated oven at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or so. When the fullness of time has come, you pull out the pan and turn it upside down on a plate and the amazing treat comes out is ready to eat.

The key thing about that recipe is patience. One has to prepare hours in advance in order for things to be just right to cook and then eat.

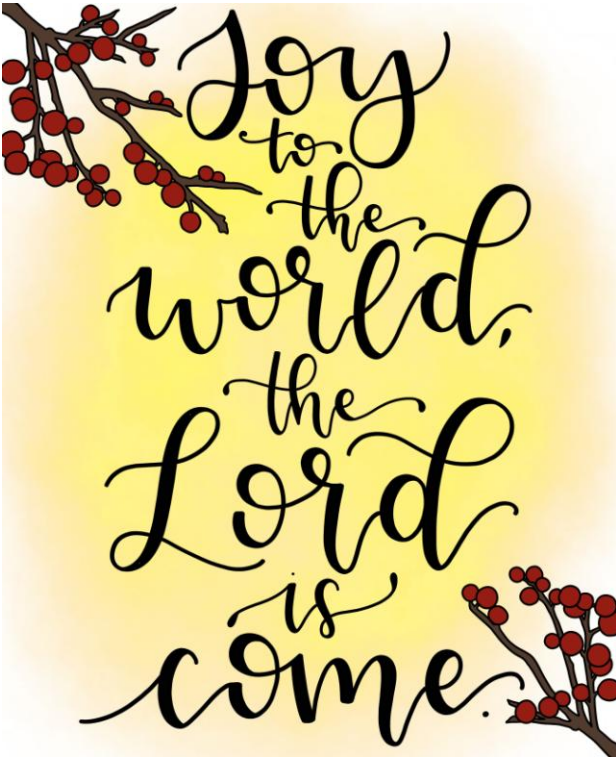
God has patience. God wanted to save His people from their sins. And in order for that to happen, many things like a recipe (scripturally, we call them prophecies) had to take place. Then when things were ready... *“When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons.”*

That event took place at Christmas. It started with the birth of a Savior. Jesus Christ “born of a woman”... so that He could live a life as a human being like us. “Born under the law”... to live a perfect life never breaking the law so He could be sinless. “To redeem us who were under the law”... Jesus came to buy us out of our sins. Jesus bought us with His own blood, shed on the cross to earn our forgiveness of sins. “So that we might receive adoption”... Being forgiven sinners means that we who believe are adopted into God’s family.

When the fullness of time had come, God made an amazing thing happen. He forgives us and includes us in His family... an heir to the glory of heaven! It took patience and it happened just according to His plan. The best recipe ever for us – forgiveness and everlasting life. It all happened with one Jesus Christ!
