George Frederick Handel's oratorio "Messiah" is immensely popular with both classical music listeners and folks who listen to the latest hip-hop. Written in 1741, the entire work was completed in about 24 days. The oratorio, which is in 3 parts, outlines the life of Jesus, starting with an Advent/Christmas section and ending some two hours later with Jesus on his heavenly throne and all of heaven singing a glorious Amen. On Easter Sunday, our Trinity Choir will sing two choruses from this work. The chorus, "Since By Man Came Death" from part 3, so beautifully sets the text "Since by a man came death, also by a man came the resurrection of the dead" from 1 Corinthians. The opening unaccompanied phrase depicting the darkness of death brought on by Adam, changes immediately to the glory of Christ's resurrection. The opening theme of the Hallelujah chorus, which ends part 2, of "Messiah" can probably be hummed by almost anyone. Our choir will add that as well to our Easter morning service, proclaiming that our God reigns forever.

Music has always been an important part of our Holy Week services, there is so much wonderful music that is going to be sung, from Sir Karl Jenkins's riveting "Benedictus" whose Hosannas will fill the church with the crowd's shouts on Palm Sunday, Mozart's sublime "Ave Verum Corpus," speaking of Christ's body broken for us on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday our children's choirs will sing "Jesus Loves Me" and "A Lenten Love Song" describing Christ's love for us at the family service. Good Friday evening, a new award winning anthem will be sung by the Trinity Choir at the evening Tenebrae, Tim Shaw's "Jesus, Refuge of the Weary," a new tune using the traditional text. Our Easter Vigil's music is so unique to the service, with the ancient chant of the *Exultet* proclaimed in a candlelit church, it has to be experienced in person to truly do it justice. Join us for worship at each service during Holy Week, as our Lenten journey passes the upper room, then the cross on Golgatha, and finally comes to its triumphant close on Easter.

Honor, Serve, Provide Capital Campaign



We are thrilled to let you know that we are amazingly close to our \$210,000 three-year goal. Of the \$208,896 that is comprised of pledges, one-time donations and memorial gifts, we have received over \$147,000. Our completed projects have utilized just over \$71,000 leaving us almost \$76,000 for additional planned projects. Letters to those of you who have made pledges will be sent out in the next few weeks seeking the second year of your commitment to the campaign. We are so grateful for your response to the Trinity's *Honor, Serve, Provide* Capital Campaign.

The Board of Properties is moving forward with our conversion to energy efficient LED lighting throughout our facilities. The cafeteria and halls nearby have already been changed. Going forward additional hallways and classrooms will be converted continuing this cost-savings effort.

Trinity Lutheran School's 65th Anniversary celebration, highlighted by the May 10 dinner will, hopefully, add to Capital Campaign funds with specific projects for the school. Trinity's *Honor, Serve, Provide* Capital Campaign will continue to restore and renovate Trinity's overall facility.

As we are in the midst of the season it is good to reflect on the words of Psalm 51:17: **"The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; A broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise."** The entire season of Lent is about penitential reflection. We should confess the "broken" state of our hearts and spirits. In this broken and sinful condition we would be without hope if we did not have a God that "will not despise" a "broken and contrite heart."

To be penitent is to be broken and contrite. Although it is sin within our hearts for which we are contrite and penitent, it is also our sinful condition that prevents us from acknowledging our sin. We are caught within a hopeless and vicious cycle of sin unless we are rescued. We cannot will ourselves into having a penitent heart. It must be given to us.

It is a heart transplant that we need, as Psalm 51:10 puts it: **"create in me a clean heart, O God."** The Psalmist doesn't say, "repair my old heart," but **"create a clean heart."** The Holy Spirit, active through the Word of God, has given you this new and contrite heart. God's Word has convicted you of your sin (Law) and convinced you of your need for your Savior's forgiveness (Gospel).

Sins are forgiven through the Word of God as He commands. That Word delivers real forgiveness when spoken into ears, applied with water in Holy Baptism, and combined with bread and wine to deliver Jesus' own body and blood to sinners.

The new heart, created by God, even finds joy in what otherwise seem to be dry and boring words once simply memorized to satisfy a requirement of confirmation instruction. From Luther's Small Catechism:

What is confession?

Confession has two parts. First that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting, but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven.

What sins should we confess?

Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even those we are not aware of, as we do in the Lord's Prayer; but before the pastor we should confess only those sins which we know and feel in our hearts.

As the Holy Spirit works within your new heart through the Law and the Gospel of God's Word, may you be prepared to travel to the foot of Jesus cross this Lent and then to the empty tomb on Easter trusting in the God who does not despise, but loves your broken and contrite heart.

"No, I imply that what pagans sacrifice they offer to demons and not to God. I do not want you to be participants with demons. You cannot drink the cup of the Lord and the cup of demons. You cannot partake of the table of the Lord and the table of demons. Shall we provoke the Lord to jealousy? Are we stronger than he?" (1 Corinthians 10:20-22)

Strange as it may seem, in the 21st century we Christians often fellowship with demons. We do so when we expose ourselves to ungodly forces in politics, the media, and academia that espouse a non-Christian worldview. Such a worldview rejects or ignores the God of the Bible in favor of pluralism which deems all religions equal. They are not. There is no God but the God who has revealed Himself in the Bible and in our Lord Jesus. There is no way to fellowship with Him except through Jesus Christ.

The terrors of Hell await those who deny this truth, those who have no faith in Jesus. When I warn people about Hell I often hear them say "Life is hell." Now life is often filled with difficulties and hard times interspersed by some good times as well. But if this life is as bad as many say it is, and it can be pretty bad for the Christian, it is a lot worse for the unsaved. We Christians can face suffering and death with comfort and peace for we know that there is unending relief and joy for us in heaven. But for those who do not believe that Jesus is God and that He died for their sins, death holds only terror or uncertainty for them, no prospect of relief no matter what they may say or think.



We who know the truth, we who see the danger, are called to warn others about the punishment that awaits them. We are the watchmen who must sound the alarm (Ezekiel 33:7-9). We must go and preach salvation in Jesus Christ to the lost, in word and deed, regardless of what they make think say or do to us, regardless of any discomfort it may cause us, or how foolish it looks. If we don't go out and witness the Gospel to others, their discomfort will be far greater than any we could experience and it will be without end. If they choose to reject God, let it not be because we failed to carry out the warning.

There are many opportunities to do this including presenting the Gospel to our relatives, friends, co-workers and neighbors in our neighborhoods, offices, and the stores we shop at. But many of us fear rejection or intimidation. Or we don't have the desire or are too lazy to invest ourselves in life-style evangelism. Life style evangelism involves befriending people, talking to them, helping them, having compassion on them, praying with them. In other words, life style evangelism means showing other people the gospel in actions as well as in words. If you want help in doing this, please contact Deacon Anthony to join in a program that will help you learn and carry out this great calling we have from Jesus.

God's Stewards Are Managers, Not Owners

As God's people, we have been called to be God's stewards in this world. We have been entrusted with life and life's resources and given the privilege of responsibly and joyfully managing them for Him.

"The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." (Gen. 2:15)

"The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." (Ps. 24:1; see also Ps. 89:11)

"But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to give as generously as this? Everything comes from you, and we have given you only what comes from your hand." (1 Chron. 29:14; see also vv. 1-20)

"And they [Macedonian Christians] did not do as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then to us in keeping with God's will." (2 Cor. 8:5; see also vv. 1-7; Luke 12:41-48; 1 Tim. 6:17-19.

These truths about stewardship remind us that God owns everything we have, something which may come as a surprise to us. We think we worked and earned what we have so we are free to do what we like with it. But God entrusts to us all we have in order that we manage His resources. He, not we, is the owner. He graciously gives to us enough to meet our physical needs and those of our families, but He also blesses us with resources in abundance so that we may use them to give Him glory.

As a result, all that we have, time, talents as well as treasure, ought to be used for His glory and to build up His Kingdom not our own. And giving ought to be done in love and thankfulness not out of obligation, as a response to the love and blessings which God has given us. We give to the Church which is God's Kingdom on earth. We are called to give with cheerfulness out of our firstfruits not out of what is left over after we have satisfied our needs, wants and desires. The bringing of regular offerings as a part of worship is a loving response to God's love for us.

“The Trinity” (1979) by Siegfried Reinhardt (located in the East Wing) is an original pencil drawing on paper embellished with 14-karat gold leaf and was given in memory of John W. Arreola and his sister MaryAnn by their family and friends.


Siegfried Reinhardt (1925-1984) was one of the nation’s most outstanding Lutheran artists! His themes were quite often religious as shown in “The Trinity.” Reinhardt uses the cross, triangle, dove, crown of thorns, pierced hand and three nails -- all Christian symbols depicting the three-in-one entities of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. He also uses the Alpha and Omega symbols to represent Jesus as the beginning and end of all things and as a reference to our One True God (Rev.22:13). Reinhardt once explained his use of gold leaf that seemed to appear everywhere in his lettering, sculpture pieces, furniture, paintings and murals in that he was a “displaced medievalist -- in those days gold was considered a divine gift to man with which to reflect the glory of God,” he stated.

Born in Germany, Reinhardt emigrated to north St. Louis with his family in 1928. At the age of 18 his work was publicized by a columnist and critic for the old St. Louis Star-Times. In 1942 Reinhardt had his first one-man show at a local gallery. After graduating from high school in 1944 and a stint in the Army Reinhardt received a BA degree in 1950 from Washington University. He was artist-in-residence twice at Southern Illinois University and became permanent artist-in-residence at St. Louis Community College-Meramec.

Reinhardt’s work spanned a host of media including: furniture, enamels, graphics, metal etchings, murals and stained-glass windows. His stained-glass windows grace churches throughout Missouri and the Midwest. Among his many important achievements are “The Man of Sorrows,” painted on seven continuous half-hour weekly shows for National Educational Television in 1955; The Rand McNally Mural in Skokie, Illinois; two mosaic murals at Concordia Senior College in Fort Wayne, Indiana and the mosaic triptych for the Jefferson National Expansion Memorial, which is displayed in the Visitors Center under the Arch, in St. Louis, Missouri. Reinhardt won The Prize for Painting at Stazione Marittima, Trieste, Italy. He also won The First International Exhibition of Sacred Art Award with his painting, “Crucifixion,” which is in the permanent collection at the Whitney Museum of American Art, NY. Mr. Reinhardt is one of only two American artists whose works hang in the permanent collection of the Vatican Museum.

Reinhardt’s work as a muralist may have gained him the most public notoriety. “AVIATION: An American Triumph” -- a 142 foot-long by 8 foot-high mural at Lambert St. Louis International Airport was completed in 1982. The mural in images and symbolism portrays a patriotic view of the history of manned flight with emphasis on American and St. Louis achievements. This was an epic work and held Reinhardt’s attention for nearly three years -- it was Reinhardt’s last major work.

PROTECTING THE INNOCENCE OF CHILDREN: TEACHING RESILIENCY

“People were bringing little children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw this, he was indignant. He said to them, “Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Truly I tell you, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a child will never enter it.” Mark 10: 13-15 NIV

Every Sunday, when I watch the children come forward for children’s sermon, I cannot help but smile. As I look at their faces, I see curiosity, innocence, eagerness and excitement about seeing their teachers and friends. Sometimes, I see a few tears from little people just learning that they can leave their parents behind at church and be safe in the care of other loving Christians. I know they will be learning about God’s unconditional love and grace. During this hour they are nurtured and loved. What I do not know is what difficulties the children face once they leave the protection of our church family. Sadly, we cannot always tell by facial expressions what they are feeling or what living conditions they must face when they return home.

Since the beginning of recorded history, children have been neglected, abused and affected by household dysfunction. In 1998, a comprehensive study (ACE’s Study) was published to scientifically prove that Adverse Childhood Experiences greatly impact adult development¹. According to the study, as the number of adverse childhood experiences increase, so does the risk for negative health outcomes in adulthood. We now have clinical tools to determine the extent of how behaviors, physical and mental health are impacted and we have the means to be proactive in prevention of negative outcomes.

According to Dr. Dan Siegel, author of “The Yes Brain”, in order to raise resilient children, we must learn how to be a resilient parent. In order to handle our own ups and downs, we must learn how to be emotionally resilient ourselves to provide a model for children. It can be very challenging to observe emotional meltdowns and tantrums without getting unhinged. This gets more difficult if we have unrealistic expectations about the nature of childhood. Sometimes we look at difficult situations as problems needing to be fixed. Parents who are able to face powerful emotions with their children are better able to handle difficult interactions more calmly.²

In my experience as a mother, teacher and social worker, I have worked with many children in many capacities. I learned to become more aware of my own emotional challenges in order to be more respectful of children around me. This task can feel overwhelming but as we practice honesty with ourselves, we can learn to be more emotionally available and stable. All emotions are a consequence of being human.

Adults must actively listen without interruption to help children learn to express themselves with words. Sometimes they need help to learn how to identify what they are feeling and how to express these emotions in a more positive way. We can reassure them we love them by holding them close and still maintain appropriate boundaries. We can set limits and boundaries with compassion. Every day we are confronted with stories of terrible tragedy. Children are abused and neglected in all socio-economic groups throughout the world. Let us remember what our Lord taught us to love one another and protect our children at all costs. I become indignant when I see children being abused. Let us be a part of the solution rather than part of the problem.
