What Is Your Focus this New Year?


A man works at a lumber mill. One day, the worker is going home and this particular day pushes a wheelbarrow out with a small box in it as he goes out to his truck. The security offi-

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The Good News From the Minister of Music

O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright

We will be singing the hymn, "O Morning Star How Fair and Bright" (LSB 395) on January 5. It is known as the "Queen of Chorales" because of the majesty of its text and tune. Its message of hope in the face of death is incomparable. (By the way, there is a King of Chorales as well - "Wake, Awake, For Night is Flying," LSB 516, also by Nicolai, but that's another newsletter article to come.)

When Philipp Nicolai wrote the words and melody to this hymn in 1597, he was a German Lutheran pastor in the city of Unna in Westphalia, Germany. While there, the city was hit by a scourge of plague that took the lives of more than 1,300 of its citizens. This widespread death so close to home impacted Nicolai in a profound way. It has been noted that more than once, up to 30 graves were dug for those claimed by the rat-and-flea-borne menace, and these were laid to rest within the sight of his house, which overlooked the graveyard.



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From this catastrophe, which must have struck terror in the lives of anyone near its march, Nicolai found inspiration in four different Scriptures. One of these came from

Zechariah's prophecy in Luke 1. Here is John the Baptist's father, filled with the Holy Spirit and speaking exuberantly about Jesus, after being silenced by the angel Gabriel for his previous unbelief. In Luke 1, beginning at verse 76, Zechariah sings, "*And you, Child, will be called the Prophet of the Most High; for You will go before the Lord to prepare His ways, to give knowledge of salvation to His people in the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace". How comforting the words of Zechariah must have been to the hymn-writer. All around him, encroaching nearer, death was spreading over the city. Left and right, Nicolai's parish members were being claimed by this horrific disease, dying terrible deaths as their organs failed and their bodies shut down. And in the middle of this devastation, God's Word speaks. The Promised One has come; His arrival brings the knowledge of salvation, the forgiveness of sins, and a light to those who sit in darkness. Each of the hymns six verses speak to Christ being with us, giving us life. As his parishioners lost their lives, Nicolai's hymn reminded all that, Christ gives life, He is with us today, tomorrow and everyday. Is there anything more comforting than to know that our Savior is always with us?*

What joy to know, when life is past, the Lord we love is first and last, the end and the beginning! He will one day, oh, glorious grace, transport us to that happy place beyond all tears and sinning! Amen! Amen! Come, Lord Jesus!

Happy New Year from the Capital Campaign Committee!



We are so excited to start off the new year with wonderful news. As of December 18, between pledges and memorial donations of \$244,400, more than \$212,455 has been received! (The remaining \$31,900 in pledges is due in 2020). We have reached our goal in cash received! And we thank you most profusely for your support of Trinity Lutheran Church and School.

We began with a list of projects, which have almost all been completed. And, as you know, additional capital projects have cropped up. Like any building owner the list never ends. But

we are happy to let you know that while over \$142,000 has been spent on our projects \$70,000 is available to complete those we began with and those that have arisen.

Our projects have included:

Installing new carpeting in the church, repair and replacement of glass windows on the church and school, a renovated science classroom with manipulatives, improved parking lot lighting, LED light conversion in classrooms and hallways, security camera improvements, replaced ceiling in one classroom and pastor's office, school boiler repairs, replaced water heater, roof fan repairs, church ductwork sealing, partial payment for church/school banners, additional security upgrades, parking lot asphalt repair, landscaping and playground mulch, and painting of school exterior and classrooms (by volunteers).

Our Capital Campaign Committee now consists of: Pastor Hopkins, Principal Mary Leake, Jane Kramer, Lynn Waldeck, Doris Gargan, John Haines, John Vergara and Lauren Straub.

We are indebted to the Board of Properties for their guidance, expertise and countless hours of work. Trinity owes this unpaid workforce more than we could ever repay. Thank you: Rich Evans, John Haines, Warren Breuer, Dan Pugliese, Carl Osmundsen, Scott Hare, Ed Kuck, Tom Perovich, Matt Musumeci and Fred von Bargen, Sr.

ECC 50th Anniversary Continues


Christmas Wish list concludes on Epiphany, January 6, 2020.

The Eager Conversationalist/Spiritual Conversation Curve Workshops

Spiritual Conversations in the Digital Age, a monograph based on Barna Group research, revealed something: people talk less about spiritual matters than they used to. Whatever the reasons for this reluctance, research shows there are ample benefits to including God in our conversations.

Lutheran Hour Ministries is offering two workshops that address the data and offer ways for us to be better spiritual conversationalists.

Dr. Jason Broge, director of design and development for LHM's Global Ministries, hosts *Eager Conversationalists: A Hopeful Look at What Prepares Christians for Spiritual Conversations.* This introduces the EAGER Profile Inventory, a self-evaluation tool participants can use to assess their level of willingness to engage in spiritual conversations. Barna data from 25 years ago shows that Christians took more responsibility to share their faith. Not so today as those numbers are in decline. Completing an EAGER Profile Inventory helps believers assess their character traits and spiritual habits which then factor into their willingness to have spiritual conversations. The good news is we can all become more intentional in our outreach and actually *enjoy* sharing Jesus with others when we do.

Don Everts, manager of content development for LHM, hosts *The Spiritual Conversation Curve: A Practical Tool for Reluctant Witnesses.* "What should I talk about?" "How will I respond to their questions?" "What if I don't know the answer?" These queries are natural. What's important, Everts says, is this: "It helps if we are in some way prepared to lean into those moments." The Spiritual Conversation Curve is crucial here as it lets us assess if the person we're speaking with is unreceptive, receptive, or seeking. We can then gauge our words to *graciously adapt* to their "spiritual posture," keeping our faith discussions open and comfortable.

The Board of Outreach is planning to conduct these workshops in two consecutive sessions, either on Saturday morning, Sunday afternoon, or Monday evening beginning in February. Email your questions and availability to: ACavaliere@trinityhicksville.org

Since we focused on the season of Advent last month, I can't help but relate the symbolism of the Advent candles to the Comfort Dog Ministry.

The Candle of Hope

On Wednesday, December 11 in Newark, Amos, Abraham, Leah, Lily, Lydia and Kezia Comfort Dogs brought love and joy to dozens of children fighting pediatric cancers and their families at United Airlines Newark, Terminal C, as they boarded a plane to the North Pole.



United Fantasy Flight is a volunteer effort by United Airlines employees and sponsors. United provides the plane, use of the terminal, a flight crew, and hundreds of other employee volunteers who bring the North Pole to life with Santa, elves, reindeer, wooden soldiers, sugar plum fairies, and other characters.

The Comfort Dogs were present to add smiles to the children's faces who are going through some very difficult health struggles. Each child received a Comfort Dog coin purse with a picture of a golden retriever on it for them to collect each dog's card.

There was a young woman who pulled one of the handlers aside and asked to talk to her. She was struggling and felt she has no one else to turn to. The handler, who has been trained to work through these types of situations, pulled her off to the side and talked to her and prayed with her. Like so many of the parent's of the children, this young woman was looking for an ounce of hope in a tough time in her life. The Comfort Dog Ministry maybe provided just a little bit of hope to her that day.

The Candle of Faith



Abraham has had a woman from Pennsylvania donating to his ministry monthly. She heard about him and his work at a retreat and wanted to support him. With the help of two of his handlers, they traveled to Lancaster, PA to see her. She is now in hospice care and just lost her husband the week before. She is frail but so strong in her faith. Her eyes lit up when Abraham came walking in the door. When he did his "rise" command on her bed, she smiled from ear to ear as she scratched behind his ears. She shared about her love for Jesus and that she was ready to go spend Christmas

with Him. As the woman spoke, Abraham just settled in so she could continually pet him as she shared her faith in God with his handlers and that he too brings her comfort.

The Candle of Joy

We as ministry partners, have the privilege to see the reactions of people as we visit. Abraham recently went back to check in on Mr. Tom. Mr. Tom was the gentleman who lost his daughter to suicide just shortly after Abraham came to New York. Mr. Tom found Abraham's card in his daughter's belongings. He sobbed when he saw Abraham but then asked if his granddaughter could meet him. He also wanted to hear all about what Abraham has been doing since the last time he saw him. Mr. Tom went from crying to joy as he heard about all of Abraham's adventures.





The Candle of Peace

So many times as we leave a visit, we hope that we have provided some type of comfort and peace. Sometimes that level of peace is to calm an unsettle child and utilizing Abraham to refocus them. Or it may be a person with a heavy heart that just needs a calm distraction of petting a dog to give them a moment of tranguility.

As we conclude the season of Advent, remind yourself of the message of the angel "Peace on earth and good will toward men." An ounce of kind-

ness can go a long way, even to a stranger. That is Jesus working in us to spread his love.

The Good News The Art at Trinity

The Paul August Jud Memorial ~ 1956 (located in our school's west corridor between the gym and cafeteria entrance doors) is a wood carving of Jesus Blessing a Young Boy. This memorial was designed by Albert Wood & Sons, Port Washington, NY in memory of Paul Jud, one of our school's former students who died so tragically young.

In 1962, Pastor Emeritus Edward Stammel commissioned Albert Wood & Sons to design the two tiled niches behind the wood carvings. Several color combinations of Cambridge Tile were used for the backarounds and American Olean gold accent tiles were used to adorn the borders. It was around this same time ~ 1963, the wood carving of "Christ The Good Shepherd" (located in our school's west corridor, near the north staircase leading to the 2nd floor of the school) was designed by Albert Wood & Sons and installed in the constructed, second niche. This beautiful carving was given in memory of Eleanor Pflugfelder by her sister, Florence Eisemann and friends.

DIVINE DESIGNS A Trade Built on Faith

OME COMPANIES only have hope that their business will thrive. Albert Wood & Five Sons Inc. has faith to sustain it.

The Port Washington firm is devoted to designing The Port Washington firm is devoted to designing and furnishing houses of worship, and its genesis was in the Great Depression, when churches and syna-gogues served as places where the nation's masses petitioned providence in pursuit of prosperity. Since then, the multidenominational Wood family has designed, renovated and constructed 225 syna-organ soncturaises and church changle all over the

ogue sanctuaries and church chapels all over the United States and in Canada and Puerto Rico. "After World War II, there was a big church boom

on Long Island as potato fields gave way to suburbs," says Moyer Wood, the 76-year-old president of the company his father founded. "In the '50s and '60s, we did over 70 churches in the greater New York area."

Its entry into synagogues came in 1950, when Tem-ple Beth El in Great Neck tapped the family to create an ark, a lectern and chairs for the High Holidays. Through word-of-mouth, that assignment led to synagogues in 30 states, and today temples account for the majority of its revenue.

The cost of designing and furnishing a new sanctu-ary can range from \$25,000 to \$150,000, which typically represents about 10 percent of the entire con-

cany represents about 10 percent of the entire con-struction budget, says Wood. "In the last four years, we've only done one church on Long Island but three to four synagogues," says Wood, whose company has done work for such local houses of worship as Huntington Methodist, St. Ger trude's Roman Catholic Church in Bayville and Temple Sinai in Roslyn Heights. It has current projects in Alabama, Pennsylvania and Texas.

The Wood family's religious affiliations are as di-

verse as the geographic locations of its projects. "I'm a Quaker and some of us are Catholics, Christian Scientists and Episcopalian — whatever our wives are." That diversity at home, as well as study and meetings with synagogue committees, Wood says, has helped

the company understand the needs of its clients. Today, Albert Wood is one of the few companies in the country that limits its design work to houses of worship.

"There are very few firms that just specialize in religious sites, because it's very difficult for a firm to maintain that as their only source of income," says Doris Justis, executive secretary of the 625-member Interfaith Forum on Religion and Architecture in Washington, D.C.


wasnington, D.C. Founded in 1932, the company has its roots in hope chests. "My father made a hope chest for Amelia Ear-hart and carved three of her flights on it. Her around-the-world flight was to be carved later," Wood says. The family later moved into repairing furniture,

producing custom-made furniture and, during World

War II, casting models for airplane parts. When the war ended and Wood's four brothers returned home, the family patriarch entered the busi-ness of spiritual space design, tapping into the artistic talents of his five offspring. Eventually, Frank, who oversaw the finishing shop; left the family business for journalism, and Bertram, who ran the wood shop, became a production manager for Broadway shows.

Still active in the business are Paul, 68, a designer of stained glass, tapestries and mosaics, and Gardener, 74, a wood carver and sculptor. Moyer Wood as-sumes responsibility for overall design, and he and his brothers supervise the work of local studios who supplement the family's craftsmanship.

These days, the brothers generally limit their proj-

ects to new and challenging sanctuaries. Where once the Woodses undertook 25 projects annually, today they work on five jobs a year.

"We are turning down a great deal of work," says Wood. "We are a big frog in a little pond." /III amerara maranara ranarar, maranah -----

Practical Neuroscience and Contemplative Wisdom

In recent years, I have been focusing on neuroscientific findings, which reveal that far from being fixed and unchanging, the human brain has a remarkable capacity for growth and change across one's *entire* lifespan. Neuroscientists have only scratched the surface in terms of what is known about the human brain, which leads me back to the words of the psalmist: we humans are wonderfully and fearfully made (Psalm 139:14). The research holds great promise for helping us find ways to live abundantly and less anxiously, even in these challenging and uncertain times.

In a landmark study, the American neuroscientist, Andrew Newberg, focused on particular regions of the brain as he studied a group of Franciscan nuns doing the Christian Centering Prayer every day for fifteen years. What he found by way of periodic brain-imaging scans, which has been corroborated by subsequent research, was that having a regular spiritual practice (e.g., contemplative prayer) significantly lowers activity in the stress region of the brain while increasing activity in other regions that support health and well-being.

Jesus, in the Sermon on the Mount, encourages us not to be anxious or "stressed" about tomorrow, to remain centered in the present moment of today (Matthew 6:34). And while we would all agree that his teaching is foundational for the spiritual life, there is not always clarity about *how* to put it into practice. We "get it" intellectually; in other words, we know full well it would do us good to be less anxious, but beyond an intellectual grasp of Jesus' teaching there is less understanding of how to make it a practical reality.

Sometimes I will hear congregants say that they feel guilty for not having enough faith in God to "overcome" their anxiety. Unfortunately, this "self-talk" and mental chatter becomes something of a "double whammy:" along with feeling anxious, they now feel anxious and guilty about feeling anxious. I am coming to see that it is not a matter of ignoring Jesus' teaching, but rather a lack of clarity about *how* to put his words into practice.

The recent findings of contemplative neuroscience reveal that a regular spiritual practice of contemplative prayer/meditation, even for ten or fifteen minutes a day, can make a difference in how we manage our stress, regulate our anxious feelings about the future, and ultimately live more joyfully and abundantly in the gift of today. In the words of the psalmist, "Be still, and know that I am God" (Psalm 46).

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
