



The Good News Early Childhood Center News


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

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory. Colossians 3:1-4

When we became Christians, we died to the old self and became new creatures in Christ. We are to focus on being tender-hearted and kind toward all people. We are to forgive always even as we have been forgiven, to love even as we are loved. We are never to seek our own agenda.

In this time of enforced social distancing, individuals, organizations, and retailers have increased their activity and presence on social media. Even though the medical experts and politicians cannot agree on the nature and treatment of the Coronavirus, millions of lay people and media talking heads have suddenly become experts on epidemiology. Many are accusing the governmental and medical experts of failure to address the situation in a timely and effective manner even though this virus is new and beyond the experience of anyone, except of course, the Lord God. But who speaks for God? You and I do. God is speaking through His church, through believers for such a time as this. He is calling in this time for all to repent and come to faith, believers and nonbelievers alike. Our mission is to tell others of the eternal comfort that God gives through faith in Jesus.

So how are we believers carrying out this call? When we speak our mind on social media, why do we do so? Do we do it because we want to show our knowledge, maturity, superiority, or excellence? Do we seek to justify ourselves? Do we want others to shame or hurt others? Or do we really want to help others by asking for God's blessings on all, even those we do not agree with? If so we must be careful that what we say and when we say it is tempered by love and humility, as well as the awareness of our own sinful imperfection.



What about people who always seem to post things that get under our skin? We are to engage with them, but with love and encouragement. Remember that they are human, so ask them why they think the way they do. Lift them up. Remember that people often times turn to social media to share a hurt or something upsetting—sometimes almost to the point of almost over-sharing. Take some time today to offer a supportive ear and share a gentle or kind word with someone who is hurting or sharing in a vulnerable way about something going on in their life. Ask they how they are and offer a supportive ear. And finally, notice how many times where you've reacted harshly in the past. Now would be a good time to remove your negative comments or posts. Now is the time to share love, understanding and the gospel, not political opinion, with those who disagree with you



Back on March 5, the Board of Stewardship completed Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University, a 9 week video seminar which presented sound advice on budgeting and financial planning. I was there assisting Jeanine Davis and Wayne Hoeberlein who took turns facilitating the meetings with a great deal of expertise drawn from personal experience.

As subsequent events have shown, that presentation was quite timely. A week after our last session, the government began to shut down businesses resulting in the loss of employment and income for millions of Americans. Those dozen people who attended that seminar at least had been prepared to better ride out the current financial storm because they had begun to implement Ramsey's advice.

Among other things, Ramsey recommends that people not incur debt but if they have, he shows the best way to pay it off quickly. He also espouses giving to the church using the tithe as a start. Honoring God by giving to His work should be our primary consideration when preparing our monthly or yearly budget.

One important recommendation Ramsey made was for individuals and families to have emergency savings to cover 3 to 6 months' worth of expenses. Now I have been doing that for over 30 years so I assumed that most people knew this. As Ramsey pointed out most Americans not only do not have emergency funds, they have little or no savings. They live paycheck to paycheck even those with high incomes. Most people prefer to spend now and give little thought to the future.

The heartache and sadness wrought by the COVID 19 virus alone is tragic and difficult to cope with, but the pandemic lockdown has contributed an added crushing financial burden for millions who were not prepared for any emergency, let alone one of this magnitude. If most folks had had emergency funds, some of their suffering and worry could have been ameliorated. They would not have to rely on the government to bail them out, to save them from starvation and bankruptcy. While we Christians have been called to extend charity to the hurting and the needy in times such as these, no doubt all of us would be better off if most people had heard and heeded Ramsey's advice.

We plan to do the presentation again in the Fall. Maybe you should seriously think about signing up or recommending it to a friend or loved one.
































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Finding the Silver Lining In COVID-19

So far, the year 2020 has certainly been different than what anyone could have imagined. The world seems to be on pause as we have been battling this monster known as COVID-19. The news channels have shown devastating statistics for illness and death and the spread is faster than we could have ever dreamed possible. It is natural to feel overwhelmed, scared, anxious, or depressed during a time like this... I know that I have felt all of these emotions at different times throughout the last few months. Uncertainty has replaced any sense of normalcy and it has caught us off guard. However, in the midst of these challenging times, I have also seen humanity step up. I started noticing it in the simple things. While I was out for a walk, people smiled and waved. In those moments it hit me that I was surprised by this. I wasn't used to everyone's friendly hellos. Blinded by my usual hustle and bustle, had I been missing these smiling faces? Or perhaps now that we are all forced to social distance, everyone is just happy to see another kind soul walking by.

It seems that almost overnight, people became professionals at sewing facemasks. I saw friends and family donating to humanitarian causes and supporting our overworked and exhausted healthcare and frontline workers. Pizza deliveries to hospital staff and shift change cheer groups made the difficult and long hours a tiny bit easier. Communities banded together to support the small businesses that managed to stay open. Weekly family game nights became "a thing." FaceTime and Zoom became household names and the lifeline of communication. Connecting regularly with those I usually talk to only a few times throughout the year, I started to see some positive to this otherwise horrific time in our world.

I recently read an article by Julio Vincent Gambuto called, "Prepare for the Ultimate Gaslighting." The article discusses how after this is over and things go back to "normal," we have a chance to bring back only the things that we need to. Gambuto had a different perspective on the whole situation, calling it "sacred" and highlighting that we will never have another opportunity like this to press pause on life as we know it and take a good hard look at how we have been living.

I began to see that God can use this as a time to help us see what is truly important. It is true that countless people have suffered loss so profound that there are no words to describe their grief. Although, we may never be able to fully comprehend the losses that everyone has experienced on different levels, we can, in time, begin to look forward and refocus. God promises us in Joshua 1:9 "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be discouraged, For the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." He will walk with us through this valley and bring us through to the other side.

I challenge you to try and see the silver lining. Ask God to help you take something good out of this time period. Continue to call and connect with your people. Look out for one another and be there to support each other. Know that it is okay to take time for yourself and check in to see what your own needs are. Use quiet time to have conversations with God, to pray, and to get into the word. If you haven't opened your bible in a while, this may prove to be an ideal time to start. Take this as an opportunity to choose kindness over busyness and love over judgment. And above all else know that Jesus will hold us during this time and He will bring us through.
